Email Nancy Cook at nancy750@bex.net As I begin this reflection, I'd like to share a little about a beautiful and natural woodland area which is very close to where I live. It is called **OLD WOMANS' CREEK,** a nature reserve and estuary which runs off of Lake Erie to the south and connects with the Huron River just outside of Huron. It is a forested wetlands area where <u>The Senator Mike DeWine Reserve</u> does research on how the climate affects the environment and other studies. According to a sign along the path, the reserve is named after legends of early Native Americans.

As I walk through the rugged woodlands on the boardwalk/stony paths, I am touched by the sunlight peeking through the leaves onto the very old and large tree trunks streaming high into the sky. The flashes of light on the leaves enhance their shapes and varieties. And at this time of year, assorted wildflowers are seen along the path through the woods. I'm especially attracted to the beauty of the goldenrod.

The Holy Spirit had invited me to take a walk on this particular day! Earlier in the day, Sister Edna had invited me to consider writing this article in the ARK. The Holy Spirit was right on! As I walked, I recalled the many times I have walked this path over the years. Each time, I'm wondering if the tree which forms an arch over the path is still there. Sure enough, there it is! And through the eyes of my imagination, I see myself walking through the arch opening up to the beauty and silence of God's creation!

As I reflected on this article, I was inspired to remember that we are now celebrating what is called **The Season of Creation**. The season began September 1 and goes to include, Oct. 4, the Feast Day of Francis of Assisi. St. Francis is the patron saint of ecology and beloved by many Christian denominations; and, of course, all Franciscans and those who are Franciscan in heart! Held annually world-wide, an ecumenical committee suggests a theme. The theme for 2020 is: **Jubilee for Earth: New Rhythms, New Hope.** Even this theme calls us to use our gifts and imaginations to respond to the many ways we can treasure, act and pray for our common home. The honoring of creation began in 1989 when Ecumenical Patriarch Dimitrios proclaimed September 1 as a day of prayer for creation in the Orthodox tradition. The World Council of Churches was instrumental in extending the special time of the season. Pope Francis made the Roman Catholic Church's warm welcoming of the season official in 2015 with his reflective and challenging Encyclical letter, entitled **On the Care For Our Common Home, LAUDATO SI'.**

In the encyclical, Pope Francis references his predecessors, Pope John XXIII, Paul VI, St. John Paul II, Benedict XVI and present day Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew who have expressed deep concern on environmental issues which affect our world communities in multiple ways. In recent years, statements from religious leaders around the world have also encouraged the faithful to know and believe that we are part of a world-wide community connected through prayer and action for our common home.

The encyclical is profound, beautifully written and very readable. I encourage you to read it if you haven't had the opportunity to do so. Paragraph 53 includes: "Never have we so hurt and mistreated our common home as we have in the last two hundred years. Yet we are called to be instruments of God our Father, so that our planet might be what he desired when he created it and correspond with his plan for peace, beauty and fullness."

Nature has a way of lifting us and nourishing us. Taking walks, sitting outside or simply taking time to look out our window delights our heart. And so I'd like to invite you to a prayer practice which was given to me many years ago from a Franciscan Sister Retreat Director. She entitled the prayer "A Walk of Thanksgiving and Praise." We could perhaps adapt the title to: "A Loving Gaze in Thanksgiving and Praise."

Sister invites us to pray using each of our senses: sight, hearing, touch, taste and smell. Along with my Sister friend, I invite you to allow yourself to go deep within and know how God has used your senses to open your whole being to His life in you. I quote: "Reflect upon all that sight has contributed to your life experience to enrich it: beauty, happiness, pleasure, reading, observing etc." Allow your thoughts, emotions and reflections to open your soul to gaze and pray in thanksgiving and praise.

My walks at Old Womans' Creek have given my senses wonderful opportunities. Even if you are reading this article after October 4, the beautiful Fall season will give each of us many opportunities to praise God.

Oh and by the way, one of the benches at Old Womans' Creek caught my eye. Carved on it is: <u>"ADOPT THE PACE OF NATURE; ITS SECRET IS PATIENCE."</u> by Ralph Waldo Emerson This quotation seems 'just right' as we move through this difficult time due to the virus. We know God walks with us!

Recently, the well-known reading from Ecclesiastes 3:1-11 that starts, "There is an appointed time for everything, and a time for everything under the heavens..." was read at a daily Mass. It struck me how I forget about those words from Scripture when I am adjusting to the different way of life I am experiencing now, not necessarily viewing that this is the appointed time for these events.

I have been enjoying immensely a daily reflection book named, "Balaam's Donkey" by Michael Casey, OSCO. [The purpose of the title reflects that "God can use any channel to communicate a message - and that includes Balaam's donkey".]

One of the reflections, aptly named "Seasons", says, "As the famous reading from the third chapter of Ecclesiastes reminds us, there is a season for everything under the sun. This is more than mere poetry; it is reality, and we had better get used to it. Everything changes." Not that everything <u>may</u> change, but that everything <u>does</u> change.

And the reflection continues," There are seasons in our life. What was appropriate in youth may not be suitable for mellower years. If we are wise, we will not allow ourselves to adhere to attitudes and practices that have passed their **use-by date**." (Bold by me.)

I look at this term of "use-by date" to not only referencing age appropriate behavior, but also faith appropriate behavior. As ongoing conversion in my relationship with God continues, and I work to reflect that growth in my actions, the hope is that I will see more opportunities for positive change, and take those opportunities, large or small. Sending a card. Calling someone who I know needs to be called. Making a meal for a family struggling for whatever reason. Holding my tongue when it isn't necessary to speak. Being gracious in traffic and in the lines in stores, especially with those who are not being gracious. Speaking of Christ to someone who is thirsting for hope amid all the uncertainty of the world.

For those of us blessed to be in relationship with Our Lord, it is always the season for taking those opportunities for kindness, for thoughtfulness, for generosity, for affirmation, for accompanying each other in love and truth.
