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Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Who are we?

Here we are, in the beginning of February in the year 2021 with Lent just around the bend. How will our Mardi Gras experiences look this year? It was one of the last “normal” days of 2020 for me. I was able to celebrate that day with my sisters and Mercy associates at St. Bernardine Home. For their protection I have not been able to be there since. The following day I received ashes on my forehead alone with the rest of the Christian world. (Yes, not just Catholics ‘do’ ashes on Ash Wednesday) But by the Third Sunday of Lent our bishop was encouraging us to refrain from attending Mass in person and by the Fourth Sunday our Churches were closed. Something that had never happened as far as we could remember, ever! I remember thinking, ‘well, this gives new meaning to our Lenten fast!’ And thought how wonderful Easter would be when we could be back in our parishes to celebrate and receive Eucharist once again. It was a Holy Week and Easter like no other. And yet it was a time that was rich in the presence of our Suffering Jesus and our Risen Savior. Roman 8:38-39 came immediately to my heart: “For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord “.

It was not Easter, but June last year before we were able to return to our parishes in a limited capacity, and for some of us with health issues we have still not been able to return. We have joined virtually thanks to Livestream and Facebook Live and Videos and have stayed connected because it is *who we are*. A pandemic cannot take us away from our God. It can separate us physically from one another, but it cannot separate us from our Christian communities because we are joined by so much more than the physical. Some of us have been sick, and some of our brothers and sisters have died. We have mourned them but have not been able to celebrate their lives as we would have in 2019. But still, we have celebrated their lives because that is *who we are*.

From the desk of Fr. Jim Brown

Greetings in the name of Jesus our Lord my beloved sisters and brothers in Christ.

As we begin this second month of 2021 it feels very much like the last 12 months. While vaccinations are on the horizon for many of us, we are still masked, social distancing, washing hands and sanitizing everything in sight. And still complaining about it all. The month of February brings two events that we can reflect on: Valentine Day and Ash Wednesday and the Lenten Season.

If you've been in any store, large or small, they all look a lot like Target stores with the red displays of hearts, candy, flowers and cards and other enticements to remember the 14th as the day of Romance. While it is good to promote love and friendship, romance, and relationships it usually becomes as superficial as the advertising. And the day after...it is over.

Well, we have the opportunity to go much deeper in the meaning of the words, "I love you." It is much more than just a good feeling, but it means a commitment to the other from us. When we use these three little words, they can be very powerful for they mean that "I give myself to you; I'm here for you; I want you to become the best person that you are meant to be, even at my own expense." It is a sacrificial love, an 'agape' type of love that comes from God Himself.

St John writes of this in his first letter: *"Beloved, let us love one another; for love is of God, and he who loves is born of God and knows God. He who does not love does not know God; for God is love. In this the love of God was made manifest among us, that God sent His only begotten Son into the world, so that we might live through Him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that He loved us and sent His Son to be the expiation for our sins. Beloved, if God loved us, we ought to love one another, God abides in us and His love is perfected in us."* (1 John 4:7-12)

So, by our sacrificial love for others, we can be a sign and witness to God's love for and in this world that He created, sustains, and redeemed and sanctified. Now we know it is easy to love people who

love us, or who like us, or who even tolerate us, right, but what about the folks who are polar opposites from in their thinking, in their beliefs or in their politics. How do we go about loving them? I think the best way is to realize that God loves them and created them just as much as he does us. And that Jesus suffered and died for them just as he did for us. They just can't see it or believe it, but it is a truth that we know and have to share with them. By the power of the Holy Spirit may they see the light of God's love. We just show up and sow the seed. Reflecting on that kind of Love that Jesus lived, taught, and died for is what our LENT is all about. We begin with Ash Wednesday – I guess it will be different this year as the ashes will be sprinkled on our head rather than on the forehead. But it begins our 40-day retreat that is meant to help us reflect on our own humble beginnings as creatures of the earth and our baptism that elevated us to become children of the Father. We recognize our sinfulness and brokenness and yet God's everlasting love and covenant relationship with us. He calls us back to Himself. All of this is played out in the Passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus our Lord. So, February might be a short month, but it has a lot for us to think about, pray about and put into practice.

May you all be blessed, and may you BE a blessing to all you meet. Help put a smile on another's face (even if you can't see it because of the mask.)

For we know in part and we prophesy in part. But when that which is perfect has come, then that which is in part will be done away. Now I know in part, but then I shall know just as I also am known. And now abide faith, hope, love, these three; but the greatest of these is love."

- Having email as most communication is done through it.

- Attending Secretariat meetings each month.

It sounds like a lot of work, but it really isn't. We do work hard on Secretariat, but we also have a lot of fun. I am willing to work with the person who steps into this position.

School of Leaders...

**To acquire wisdom is to love oneself; people who cherish understanding will prosper.
(Proverbs 19:8)**

Popular culture sends us a lot of messages about value and worth. In magazines, music, television shows, movies, sports, and any other form of entertainment, we are continually told that the respect we receive depends on the status we have - and that status is defined by wealth, style, or popular opinion. We not only begin to evaluate ourselves that way, we evaluate others that way too. If they don't work a certain kind of job, earn a certain level of income, dress a certain way, or have a lifestyle we envy, they probably aren't successful. And if they aren't successful, they aren't significant or worthy of our attention.

Real significance isn't defined by popular culture. In fact, culture often magnifies less significant things and minimizes truly significant things. If we follow trends and listen to opinions, we will be driven to seek significance in jobs that provide the status we want, income that provides the

possessions we want, and relationships that provide the security and influence we want. And we can spend our entire lives going down that path, trying to find true significance in things that can never provide it for us. We will always be running but never arriving.

The Bible tells us what true significance is, and it is not found in what we have, in the status we attain, or even in what we accomplish. It is found in knowing God, living faithfully for Him, loving Him and others, and doing whatever He has called us to do - even if it doesn't impress anyone else. It's about our identity in Him, not our achievements and possessions. We have worth not because of what we do and have, but because we are His children, and He chooses to love us. Our worth does not depend on us. Our worth is based on how He values us, and He values us simply because He made us, and we belong to Him.

Learn to see yourself as being valuable for who you are and learn to see others that way too. Until you see people the way God sees them, uniquely created with special gifts and abilities that the world may not recognize, you will sell them short. You need to see with His eyes, recognize true worth, and stop striving for unworthy goals.

Your mission is shaped by your values, and if your values are misplaced, you'll miss your true mission. Understand that status is fleeting and artificial. Pursue what's truly worthwhile!



Happy February,

February has always been known as the month of “love”. “Love” is mentioned in the Bible anywhere from 310 times to 550 times (and maybe more) depending on the Bible you read from. The Bible is all about love, even though Jesus only mentions it thirteen times.

There are different representations of love mentioned- romantic love, love between friends and siblings, self-sacrificing love (parental and Jesus’ passion) and the love of our God (John 3:16).
